Tonea Stewart, a native of Greenwood, Mississippi, now resides in Montgomery, Alabama. She is a tenured Professor and Chair of the Department of Theatre Arts at Alabama State University, a professional actress, and motivational speaker.

After receiving a B.S. degree in Speech and Theatre from Jackson State University and an M.A. in Theatre Arts from the University of California at Santa Barbara, Tonea completed her Ph.D. in Theatre Arts at Florida State University in 1989. She was the first African American female to receive a doctorate from the FSU school of Theatre and the first McKnight Doctoral Fellow in Theatre Arts. During her study at FSU, Tonea also received a fellowship from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

As an actress, Tonea is perhaps best known for her recurring role in *In The Heat of the Night*, an NAACP Image Award nomination for her role in the film adaptation of John Grisham's *A Time to Kill*, and The Gold Medal Award for the narration of Public Radio International's series "Remembering Slavery." Tonea became the first African American to direct and star on stage at New Stage Theatre, the most prestigious equity theatre in Mississippi.

Since then, she has performed in Canada, Mexico, South Korea, Scotland, Turkey and throughout the United States, including Carnegie Hall and the Kennedy Center, and she has appeared, on screen and television. Some notable titles include: *The Rosa Parks Story*; *Mississippi Burning*; *Invasion of the Body Snatchers III*; *Living Large*; *My Stepson/My Lover*; "Walker, Texas Ranger"; "Matlock"; "Leave of Absence"; "I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings"; "ER"; "Miss. Damned"; and "Touched by an Angel."

We are delighted to welcome Dr. Tonea Stewart to Myrtle Beach where she will inform and inspire South Carolina Counselors to continue to "Give Our All" in "Leading the Way to a Brighter Tomorrow."

Emerging Issues in Addiction Counseling: What Counselors Need to Know

She has held a number of leadership positions in ACA including Chair of the Southern Region, Chair of the Ethics and PPL committees, member of 3 Blue Ribbon Committees, and a member and subcommittee chair of the 20/20 Visioning Committee.



Early Recollections and Wellness Assessment

Presenter: Richard G. Deaner, Ph.D., Assistant Professor, Augusta State University Counselor Education program in Augusta, GA

This program will discuss research involving the use of early recollections as a predictor of wellness and a tool by which counselors can enhance assessment strategies. A discussion of research, rationale, methods, objectives, limitations, and cautions will be among the topics emphasized in relation to wellness and early recollections. In general, the use of early recollections as a projective technique may be a viable means by which practitioners can assess wellness and strengths of clients. Participants will have the opportunity to practice the assessment of sample early recollections during the program.

Dr. Richard G. Deaner is an Assistant Professor in the Counselor Education program at Augusta State University. Dr. Deaner has worked extensively with children and families in the school and community in Virginia and South Carolina. He has presented sessions in state, regional, national, and international arenas and has published material related to topics such as early recollections, wellness, creative expression techniques, spirituality and religion, student athletes, and multicultural issues.

Call for Nominations for Officers of SCCA

Call For South Carolina Counseling Association Award Nominations

Nominations for South Carolina Counseling Association Awards will be considered in seven categories:

1. **Outstanding Counselor Award:** This award is designed to recognize meritorious and exemplary service as a counselor. The recipient must be a current member of SCCA and at least one of its divisions. The recognized meritorious service should reflect contributions and service in the primary role as a counselor or closely related helping professional.
2. **Outstanding Administrator Award:** This award is designed to recognize outstanding service in the recipient's role as an administrator, which has had profound and lasting impact on the counseling and helping profession. While administrators from within the profession are obvious potential nominees, qualifications and experience as a counselor are not prerequisites to nomination.
3. **Distinguished Professional Service Award:** This award is designed to recognize outstanding service to promote the counseling profession. The recipient must be a current member of SCCA or have been an active member of SCCA for at least five consecutive years. The recognized service should show prolonged accomplishments.
4. **Humanitarian Award:** This award is designed to recognize a person who demonstrates exceptional caring for humanity without expectation or reward. The recipient must be both personally and professionally committed to humanitarian service.
5. **Pioneer Award:** This award is designed to recognize outstanding service to the profession and the general public over a relatively long time or for service rendered in the earlier years of the profession and/or SCCA. The recipient should have been recognized as a counselor or helping professional at the time of the "pioneer service."
6. **Legislative Award:** This award is designed to recognize a member of the state or national legislative branch of government who has made a substantial impact on the field of counseling.
7. **Human Rights Award:** This award is designed to recognize a counselor or helping professional who has demonstrated leadership and made major contributions in the area of human rights in South Carolina.

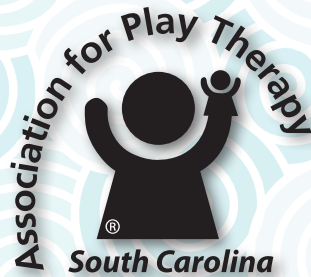
It is important that professionals who affiliate with SCCA also join and become active in those divisions and interest groups that are closely allied with their work settings. Dues are collected for:
